Good News about the Environment

Let's hear it for some good news about the environment!

In this world of terrifying environmental events, I would like to thank Christiana Zilke from LWV, Cass and Berrien Counties, for bringing attention to some good environmental news in their September *Voter*.

For example, Sudbury, Ontario, was long famous for air pollution from mining and industry, but it has been working for several decades to restore, then conserve, cleaner air. And it has worked - the air quality in Sudbury is ranked among the best in Ontario. The landscape has come alive with trees and lakes that once were acidified have become thriving ecosystems. College curricula have been created around Sudbury's work!

The Eleko dumper is a 45 ton construction vehicle used in the Alps to move rock down hill. A regenerative braking system creates and stores electricity as the vehicle takes 65 tons of rocks down. That is more than enough power for the empty vehicle to return uphill for another load. The amount of diesel fuel it does not use is breathtaking. Hats off to Switzerland.

Recyling News

ALL plastic bags (clean and dry) can be dropped off at the lobby front desk at The Helm (formerly known as SOC). The bags are used to make sleeping mats for the homeless. The bags are cut and looped together to make plastic yarn, called PLARN.

The Grosse Pointe News published a recycle option for batteries: call2recycle.org/25years or call 2recycle.org/locator. Grosse Pointe Woods Public Safety has a battery drop off in its lobby. Best Buy stores all take batteries, as well as any and all electronics.

Grosse Pointe Woods will host a Hazardous Waste Day, Oct. 19, for Woods residents with proof of residency. The other Grosse Pointes will collaborate on a Hazardous Waste Day next April. We will follow up on this issue.

Voting Rights Info. Attracts Large Crowd

Nearly 40 members of LWVGP, along with some members of the public, attended the September 19 presentation on Voter Rights. This was a great turnout, and several of our new members were also in attendance.

Sharon Dolente, Voting Rights Strategist for the ACLU, updated the group on the progress of the implementation of Proposal 3 - the ballot proposal LWV supported in 2018. Along with no excuse absentee witing, the proposal increases opportunities to register. Printed materials, provided by LWVMI, were available.

This presentation is the first of two this fall on important topics championed by LWVMI. The second presentation is Thursday, November 19, at 7 p.m., at Wayne County Community College in Harper Woods, and focuses on the 2020 census and the process of redistricting.

LWVMI has offered a \$400 grant for these programs. LWVGP is using the funds to cover the costs of any venues and printed materials.

Thanks to new member Julie Baumer who handled the sign in table, George McMullen who set up refreshments, and to Mike Florian, husband of Judy Florian, who set up the wireless microphones LWVGP Voter Services purchased this fall for use at our meetings and candidate forums.

We were able to use our own LWVGP projector, purchased last spring, and used at the June annual meeting for the first time.

Having our own equipment is important as that is one less thing for the program committee to be concerned with as we move from one venue to another to promote LWVGP and put on programs.

DEI: Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

As discussed in the last Voter, league members are encouraged to watch TED talks and participate in webinars regarding the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion initiative. Recorded webinars and TED talks may be found at the link on the left.

The DEI initiative is a journey of learning how the League may provide a positive, meaningful, and welcoming environment and to connect with marginalized communities in a way that shares power, shrinks disparities, and leads to more equitable outcomes.

Our board of directors participated in a second DEI training in September. Examples of implicit and explicit bias were discussed and how unconscious bias may impact how we plan league activities. For example, when we have planned events in the past, they were for the able-bodied privileged- those who have no problem attending our events. We need to now consider:

- location- hosting events in communities we hope to encourage to join the league
- public transportation- how will attendees get to the event
- visibility- consider those with impaired sight
- acoustics- consider those with hearing impairments
- mobility-consider those who may be in a wheelchair or have other mobility impairments
- technology- consider those who may need to use adaptive devices
- service animals- consider access and space for service dogs
- and we should advertise barrier-free facilities where we host events.

As a start, please watch at least one TED talk; they are short and very informative, and also relate to the webinars. <u>Click here to view.</u> I hope to host a membership meeting in the coming months where we can discuss the TED talks as they relate to diversity, equity and inclusion.
