The Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MIICRC) is moving full steam ahead with the process of redrawing the maps for both Congressional and State districts. I am pleased to announce that four of our members have stepped forward to serve on the Communities of Interest (COI) team. Thanks to Lauri Kingsbury, Carol Lufburrow, Judy Masserang and Cathy McAdam for volunteering to work on this project. We will provide further updates on the work of the MIICRC as it becomes available.

Local leagues will be holding town halls during April to educate communities about the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting

Commission, focusing on public participation, especially as it relates to "Communities of Interest". More details to follow.

Thanks to the over 29 members who participated in our Lame Duck Study during our program planning meeting on January 26. I was impressed and humbled by the participation and excellent feedback all provided. A final report of our discussion has been submitted to the LWVMI for their use in establishing a possible advocacy position.

DEFENDING DEMOCRACY is the theme for the League of Women Voters of Michigan's 2021 Biennial Convention. The convention will be held virtually this year and will run from 6:30 p.m. on Friday, May 21, through 5:00 on Saturday, May 22. It will include all the features you are used to seeing at an in-person convention: plenaries, workshops, awards, panel discussions, and even a silent auction. Our League can send 6 voting delegates to the convention. The cost is \$75 for delegates and \$35 for non-delegates. If you are interested in attending the convention, please let me know. The 2021 convention will be fully accessible to voting delegates and non-voting members.

I was pleased to attend a virtual webinar sponsored by LWVUS: *Voter Registration: Maintaining Our Momentum* on February 11. There was excellent information on initiatives from local leagues on voter registration during the pandemic. Also presented were strategies on how to motivate voters during a local election year.

Your Board of Directors continues to do excellent work related to programs, membership, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, communications, maintaining our financial records, working on voter services initiatives, and streamlining our job descriptions and other working documents of the League. If you'd like to attend our virtual Board meetings, they are held the 3rd Tuesday of the month. March Program Focus: Covid and Homelessness

The guest speaker for our March 23, 2021 program is Dana Paglia King, MSW candidate at Wayne State University's School of Social Work. Dana currently works as a Housing Resource Community Coordinator, where she helps clients advocate for mental health services, primary care physicians, and long-term housing supports, among other needs.

Prior to discovering social work, she earned a bachelor's degree in anthropology from WSU and spent time volunteering at Gleaners Community Food Bank in Detroit. Her undergraduate capstone project was on improving current systems for chronic homelessness in Detroit. Dana was awarded the 2020 Student Leadership in Diversity Scholarship by the Michigan Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Report

Speaker Challenges LWV to consider a new paradigm

Our February 24, 2021 LWVGP Zoom program targeted the use of data to strategize in promoting a diverse membership. We were joined by representatives from other SE Michigan Chapters. Our guest speaker was Daniel Baxter, presently Special Administrative Consultant to the Detroit City Clerk.



He described early 20th century US population shifts from the South to North for job opportunities, known as the Great Migration. Changes in Wayne County US Census data were compared from 2000 to 2010, with nearly a 25% overall population decline with movement to other parts of Michigan and out of state. Racial composition changes over that decade were compared in the cities of Grosse Pointe Farms and Dearborn. GPF experienced a reduction in the white population with an increase in Black and Asian-Americans and other non-white citizens. In contrast, Dearborn had an overall increase in population, notably in white (including Arab American) and Black residents, and a decrease in

the population of persons identified as "two or more races."

Mr. Baxter proposed strategies to help the League become a more diverse and welcoming organization:

- Forge new relationships with community organizations (churches, colleges, and universities, within and contiguous to the city). "Go where the people are whom we want to recruit";
- Expand use of technology (TikTok, Instagram, Snapchat);
- Work with city clerks to identify then reach out to newly registered voters and provide education;
- Develop short, succinct messages. Our targeted populations have multiple priorities and like short presentations. Mr. Baxter presented a brief 1-minute LWV video;
- Review our branding for possible changes;
- Use word of mouth recruitment. Use our children and grandchildren as sounding boards for suggestions on how to recruit a younger, more diverse population (what are their specific needs? how we can relate those to registering and voting?);
- Be more aggressive in our approach to voter apathy; relate apathy to threats to our democracy.

Mr. Baxter responded to many questions, and concluded with these thoughts: we are trying to create a new League, and we need a new approach for this new paradigm, with the goal that everyone who is eligible is registered and everyone who is registered votes. Exercise your right to vote and keep your community's condition in shape.

LWVGP Book Club Discussing History Through Different Lens

In October 2020, our Chapter's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee sponsored the program, "Weaving the Fabric of Diversity," led by Dr Anthony Riegel of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church. This was followed by a query of our membership to determine interest in forming a book study group. Dr Riegel volunteered to facilitate a discussion of Howard Zinn's A People's History of the United States.

A group of 21 Grosse Pointe and Detroit League of Women Voters members, plus a few additional participants, began its biweekly discussion in January. Dr. Riegel is helping us examine US history from an alternative lens, a view not traditionally seen in our educational system. The descriptions of racism, economic status, and the conquering of native Americans have caused us to examine past

misperceptions, hard truths, and offered an opportunity for sharing deeply felt experiences. It is a privilege to share and listen to the relevance of this history for real-life situations today.

This book is not an easy read, and if left to my own devices, I would have given up! The group discussion brings poignant examples of racism experienced today and underlines the truth of white privilege. As of mid-February, we've moved through the Spanish and English settlements in the New World to early wars and the American Revolution. We will soon be reading about women as "the intimately oppressed," "the other Civil War," and then progress into more current history.
