Annual Program Planning Meeting is January 11

It's a Zoom meeting on January 11 at 7 p.m. for the entire LWVGP membership. Pre-COVID, it was also a chance to have dinner together. But dinner or not, we have a lot to talk about because this is a National LWV Convention Year. We get this chance to learn about and impact the National agenda only every other year. The League calls it Program Planning and discussions take place all over the country in January through March to prepare for the biennial convention in Denver. We encourage you to attend and share your thoughts.

We will also include an update from our LWVGP Committees – a report about our own LWVGP Program Planning. We'll compare our accomplishments and plans to the Strategic Plan we adopted in June 2020. (hint: it's a great story).

Redistricting Commission Adopts Fair Maps

On December 28, the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MICRC) adopted three map plans for the U. S. House, state Senate, and state House. These are the first maps in our state's history drawn using the fair and transparent redistricting process approved by more than 2 million voters in 2018. This is an historic time, as citizens, not politicians, drew and chose the political boundaries for our Legislature and U. S. House.

The Commission worked tirelessly this year drawing maps, conducting public hearings and revising maps based on the public's comments. The proposed maps each bear the names of trees found in Michigan's forests, orchards, and backyards.

The final maps selected are as follows:

- 13 Congressional Districts: Chestnut
- 38 State Senate Districts: Linden

• 110 State House Districts: Hickory

A constitutional majority of two Democrats, two Republicans, and two unaffiliated members was needed to formally adopt the map plan.

We are pleased that members of our League were actively involved in the Redistricting Process from the very beginning. First, our League participated in the petition drive in 2018 to get Proposal 2 on the ballot. Initiated by Voters Not Politicians, our League members assisted with securing more than 425,000 signatures from registered Michigan voters to allow the proposal to appear on the ballot. In addition, Our Communities of Interest team, Lauri Kingsbury, Carol Lufburrow, Cathy McAdam and Judy Florian, worked with local citizens and organizations this past year to define communities of interest and assist with map drawing. Sue Acton, Laura Larson, Judy Masserang, Marge Freundl and Mary Rouleau also worked at a Public Hearing at the TCF Center in October.

There is expected legal action before these maps become law. We will provide additional updates when available.

Time is Running Out to View Exhibit

Don't forget-the traveling version of the **Smithsonian exhibit**, *Voices and Votes:* **Democracy in America** is still at the GP War Memorial Carriage House through January 8.

The exhibit explores the origins of American democracy, the struggles to obtain and keep the vote, the machinery of democracy, the right to petition and protest beyond the



ballot and the rights and responsibilities of citizens. Several of our members have visited the exhibit and highly recommend it.

Voter Services Update: New YGO Ready

Thanks to our Voter Services Director Mary Garlough who has updated the 2022 Your Government Officials (YGO). This is a listing of all our local, state, and national elected officials. This brochure is distributed to local city halls and libraries, as well as other public places. Pick up some extras to give to friends too. Knowing who to contact is a first step in advocacy. They will be available at these locations after January 10.

LWVGP is working with GP South High School, which has signed up for the MI Vote Matters High School Registration Challenge. This initiative, co-sponsored by the Secretary of State and Michigan Department of Education, encourages high schools across Michigan to help connect students with their right to vote through civic education and nonpartisan voter registration drives. Schools can strive for the highest voter registration rate and earn recognition from the Secretary of State for the percentage of eligible seniors who have registered or pre-registered.

Registration events will take place during the Spring.

February Program Focuses on Education

The League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe will be hosting a program: *What U.S. History Do We Teach in Our Schools?* via Zoom from 7 - 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, February 9. The program will also be recorded for future viewing.

Learning the story of our country is a crucial part of every child's education. But which story do we tell and who decides? Our program committee has assembled a panel of speakers to help attendees learn more about the state's history standards which guide curriculum for all Michigan public schools and, in particular, what children are learning about American history in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools.

We will invite members of the community to submit questions and also will accept questions during the program.
