

Florida law led school district to pull 1,600 books including dictionaries

Librarians fear new penalties, even prison, as activists challenge books

Michigan county eyed criminal ordinance for books. Librarians fought back



Attempts to censor books during this period: 938. Total titles challenged in those attempts: 9,021. Unique titles: 4,240.


A challenge may result in access being retained, restricted, or revoked at a school or public library.






Titles Challenged in Public Schools and Libraries During 2023


Attempts to censor books during this period: 938. Total titles challenged in those attempts: 9,021. Unique titles: 4,240.



BOOKS AND BEYOND

ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom tracked **1,247 censorship attempts** in 2023. Here's the breakdown:

Where Do Challenges Take Place?

Pressure groups in 2023 focused on public libraries in addition to targeting school libraries. The number of titles targeted for censorship at public libraries increased by 92% over the previous year; school libraries saw an 11% increase.

Tactics Used To Ban Books

STATE LAWS & LOCAL ORDINANCES

Developed by national organizations, used by elected & appointed officials

- Prosecutions against librarians in AR, IN, MI, MO, OH, OK, TN, WY
- Use of obscenity laws to prosecute librarians and/or ban books in AK, AL, GA, ID, IN, LA, MO, MT, ND, OK, TN, TX, WV,
- Local & state laws stopping or limiting access to books in AZ, FL, IA, MT, OH, TN, TX, UT, VA
- Local & state libraries pressured to leave the ALA in AL, FL, GA, MO, MT, TX, WY
- Decreasing or eliminating public funding for libraries in MI, MO, TX, WY



Public Meeting Tactics

Developed by national organizations, used by local affiliates

- "Blitz" strategies moving on multiple policy areas at the same time
- Reduce or remove library funding
- Attempts to privatize library management
- Secrecy closed door meetings
- Using "clappers" to pack public meetings with nonresidents & create impression that community support exists
- Copycat bans sharing lists of books to challenge
- "Doxxing" & threats of bodily harm against librarians & library employees
- Book ban supporters appointed to local library and school boards
- Cherry-picking specific words out of context in a book
- Providing scripts to use at public meetings
- Create a problem, then sell a solution

PUSHBACK

Against Book Challenges & Bans

- FOIA requests filed; "Sunshine Law" violations acted on
- Federal Appeals Courts rule against some book bans
- Observer Corps attending school & library board meetings
- State legislation to protect access to books approved or pending in CA, CT, DE, IL, MD, MI, MN, NJ, VT
- Right to Read Act 2023 introduced in US House of Representatives
- In-person library use increasing
- Resident attendance at public meetings increasing
- Banned book clubs in high schools on the rise
- Parent groups filing lawsuits contesting censorship

Does Your Community Support Book Bans? Get the facts!

- Research local sources of threat. Are they residents or outsiders?
- Develop a position statement to advocate against censorship.
- Utilize your Observer Corps (OC) at local public library and school board meetings. Invite League board members, DEI and OC committee members to be part of the action team.
- Partner with local public and school libraries. Let them know LWV supports them.
- Make "Book Challenges" a local League program. Invite librarians to share their policies with the public.
- Speak up at public library & school board meetings.



Voter Opinions - By The Numbers

- 83% support legislation to protect the right to read, regardless of party affiliation
- 70% majority said librarians capable & trustworthy
- 75% support the ability of young people's access to books
- 80% agreed that parents should set rules for their own children, but do not have the right to decide for other parents
- 77% agreed that local libraries should have a diverse collection of books

What LWVGP Did

Local League Action 2022

- 1. DEI Committee noticed FaceBook group pushing for book bans
- 2. Alerted Board of Directors
- 3. Two ad hoc committees formed to study issue at public & school libraries
- 4. Observer Corps alerted to watch for pertinent agenda items
- 5. Issue researched & position statements written
- 6. Each library position submitted to membership for approval



LWVGP's Public Library Advocacy Position

Public libraries:

- Central importance to community
- Support First Amendment rights

Library standards & governance:

- Library staff operates within ALA standards
- Librarians may act without political interference
- Library Trustees representative of community
- Trustees selected to allow community involvement
- Open public governance records
- Operate on sound fiscal plan



LWVGP's School Library Advocacy Position

- Promote intellectual freedom
- Enable children to learn critical thinking skills
- Minors have First Amendment rights
- Students should have equal and equitable access
- Only parents can restrict what their own children read
- No parent has right to restrict what another child reads
- Library staff operates within ALA standards
- Written policy & procedures for receiving parental concerns
- Teachers choose student resources without political interference



LWVGP Takes It Statewide

State League Action 2023

- 1. LWVGP researched how to bring to state convention
- 2. Submitted to state League Board of Directors
- 3. Approved for state convention agenda for concurrence
- 4. Proposed at state convention, May 2023
- 5. Delegates unanimously concurred & adopted position



Library Position In Action !!

May 2023 - Three days after adoption, LWV Marquette stops book bans at Peter White Public Library.

November 2023, Patmos Public Library - Funding restored & closure averted. Descriptive stickers added to books - enough to quiet challengers.


December 2023, Herrick Community Library - League library position highlighted at community meeting book challenges must be in writing; no successful challenges to date.


> March 2024 - LWVGP invited to address Michigan Library Association Advocacy Day



League Lingo

Concurrence: Agreement by League members with a

position on an issue reached by a small group of

members or by another League.


- "Another League": any local or state League
- Adoption of position wording must be verbatim
- Can your League use concurrence? Check your

local & state League Bylaws


No Public Library Position Use concurrence to adopt a position State or Local Leagues

- Local community events





EAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS[®]

"[T]he public library is not to be mistaken for simply an arm of the state. By virtue of its mission to provide the citizenry with access to a wide array of information, viewpoints, and content, the public library is decidedly not the state's creature; it is the people's. It is the purpose of the First Amendment to preserve an uninhibited marketplace of ideas in which truth will ultimately prevail.... It is the right of the public to receive suitable access to social, political, esthetic, moral, and other ideas and experiences which is crucial here."

 Judge Arthur Brooks, Memorandum Opinion and Order, Fayetteville Public Library, et al. v. Crawford County, Arkansas, July 29, 2023 Case Number 5:23-cv-05086
