Demonstrations voicing opposition to the administration's policies occurred in over 1,400 locations across all 50 U. S. states. LWVGP members gathered at the Detroit Institute of Arts and marched over three miles in protest.

- Current membership is 142. Welcome to new members Susan Budrys (Grosse Pointe) and Ann Walton (Grosse Pointe).
- The Board approved the draft 2025-26 budget, which is sent to the membership for review prior to the June 10 Annual Meeting when members

- vote on the budget. Review the budget at this link.
- The Advocacy Committee has completed our response to the Federal Judiciary Study and submitted it to LWVUS. A special thanks to the following committee members: Lauri Kingsbury (Chair), Nicole Castka, Marge Freundl, Vicki Granger, Ruth Hoover, and Joanne Swanson. - Voter Services is gearing up for our annual voter registration activities.
 Many members have signed up to assist with registering 17.5 year olds, along with preregistering those age 16. We will be at all of our local high schools. Julianne Phillips and Sue Acton are spearheading these events. They may also plan candidate forums, depending how many contested local races we have.
- 75th Anniversary Committee: Judy Masserang is leading a committee to plan our 75th Anniversary celebration. The event will be held on Sunday, October 5, from 4-6 p.m. Barbara McQuade will be our guest speaker. McQuade served as the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan from 2010-2017.  2) Publish your name only or 3) Do not publish any information. No other options will be available.


Member Spotlight-Julianne Phillips



Anatomy of a Lame Duck

Sue Acton attended the April 9, 2025 presentation, *Anatomy of a Lame Duck*, sponsored by LWV Detroit and the Detroit Public Library. Erika Rosebrook, from the MSU Extension Center for Local Government Finance and Policy, defined what a Lame Duck session is: the period from Election Day through the end of the legislative session. She offered a brief history of significant legislation that had passed in previous Michigan Lame Duck sessions, including Right to Work, Personal Property Tax Exemptions, and Minimum Wage Reform.

The 2024 Michigan Lame Duck session was not as productive, though there had been high hopes for major changes in the last year of the Democratic trifecta. The House descended into chaos when all the Republicans walked out over the issue of sick leave and tipped wages. A Democrat from Detroit boycotted the session, and there was no quorum for two days. A Call of the House was issued, but with no consequences enforced, this was ineffective. The House adjourned early.

The Senate was somewhat more productive. Three examples were noted.

- 1. The first prohibited housing discrimination by source of income.
- 2. The second expanded hate crime laws to include sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, and age.
- 3. The third ended the ability of counties to opt out of public transit costs.

The drama continues because there were nine bills, passed by the Senate and the House, that should have been sent to the governor for her signature in January. The current House leadership has refused to do so, despite a court order. So far, no consequences have followed the court order, so the stalemate continues. Republicans are considering an appeal. The nine bills fall into four categories: museums' ability to propose millages, corrections officer retirement

changes, debt collection prohibitions for those on public assistance, and health care limits for retirees.
